Goals & Focus Areas

Confidently handle airports, hotels, restaurants, and local interactions.

How to do it: Learn key phrases for check-ins, bookings, ordering food, and asking for help. Practice real-life dialogues so you can respond quickly and politely in common travel situations.

Recommendation: Use role-play exercises to simulate each scenario and build confidence.

Short answer: Learn essential phrases and practice real travel situations.

Use short, functional phrases and question forms.

How to do it: Focus on simple expressions that help you ask for information, make requests, and confirm details. Keep sentences short to avoid confusion.

Recommendation: Create a small list of everyday phrases and questions to review regularly.

Short answer: Use clear, simple phrases to ask and answer basic questions.

Understand announcements and signs.

How to do it: Familiarize yourself with common travel vocabulary—boarding, delays, safety instructions, directions, and warnings. Listen for keywords rather than full sentences.

Recommendation: Practice with audio clips or sample airport/train announcements.

Short answer: Focus on key travel words to understand signs and announcements quickly.



Learning Strategy — Weekly routine & methodology

Mon–Tue: Vocabulary & Listening — 30 travel phrases; practice with short audios.

Wed–Thu: Speaking role-plays — bookings, directions, ordering.

Fri: Reading — menus, signs, confirmations.

Sat: Real-world practice — use phrases with locals or online partners.

Sun: Review & journal travel language experiences.

Methodology:

scenario-based learning + active role-play; immediate output is prioritized.

Skill Breakdown

Grammar: question forms, polite requests (“Could I...?”), imperatives.

Levels & checklists

- **Beginner:** Learn 200 travel phrases; manage check-in and ordering tasks.
- **Intermediate:** Hold 5–10 minute conversations with locals; understand announcements.
- **Advanced:** Negotiate travel problems (delays, refunds); manage transactions.

Quick self-check rubric:

- Can you book a hotel on the phone? (Yes/No)
- Can you ask for directions and follow them? (Yes/No)
- Can you order food and ask about allergies? (Yes/No)

- Read a local menu and list 5 new words.

Extra tips to stay consistent
